We can do more together than we can do alone




Global Refuge has played a key role in welcoming refugees and asylum seekers through major humanitarian crises from WWII to the war in Ukraine.

Every New American has a story.





Behind every statistic is a human being. The thousands of immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers in the United States bring with them a complex tapestry of struggles and successes, fears and dreams—personal histories that enrich the American cultural fabric and embody the beautiful diversity of our country.

Here are three such stories: of Emillie, Juanita, and Pedro, all of whom started their new lives with the support of the Global Refuge network.

Emillie Binja

A life of service

For a small Lutheran congregation in Clackamas, Oregon, the warm, welcoming smile of Pastor Emillie Binja is a constant presence.

But her journey to the community was a difficult one. At just 8 years old, Emillie's world forever changed when her family fled the political turmoil of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, seeking refuge in Uganda. She spent most of her childhood in a refugee camp there, unable to speak the language and facing hostility from local groups who had become violent toward anyone they deemed a foreigner.

"The biggest insecurity for refugees is that you always know you're an outsider," she says. "At some point, someone will say you don't belong, and you need to leave. And sometimes that 'need to leave' could cost you your life."

For 15 years, Emillie's family sought refuge, applying for status in various countries in pursuit of a new beginning. Their long wait ended when, at 24, Emillie and her family found sanctuary in Tacoma, Washington, welcomed by a compassionate host family and aided by the services of the Global Refuge network.

As she adapted to her new life, Emillie found her calling – a calling to ministry. Recognizing her innate gifts of communication and compassion, her church pastor saw in Emillie the makings of a minister. Her empathy and wisdom beyond her years soon led her to Creator Lutheran Church, where she now stands as a beacon of faith and guidance for her congregation.

"Faith requires taking that one step, crossing over that river, and getting over that fear to say, 'I'm going to see what God is calling me into,'" she says.

Buoyed by her unwavering faith and resilience, she crossed that river—leading her to her true purpose in a community she can finally call home.

Juanita

Fostering love and hope

Navigating senior year with a load of advanced-placement classes, cross country and track meets, and the normal teenage pressures can be overwhelming for most high schoolers. But for Juanita, it was just another challenge she was more than prepared to overcome.

Juanita's journey as a New American began at age 11 when she immigrated to the U.S. from Guatemala with her father. Unfortunately, her father was soon deported, leading to years of constant relocation, changing schools, and adapting to new communities. Through it all, Juanita remained focused on her singular goal: getting into college.

"I just had this really big dream of continuing with my education and learning more things," she says. "I couldn't throw that away that easily."

After months in temporary housing in Arizona, Juanita eventually found the stable home she had been hoping for since coming to America. Ascentria Care Alliance, a part of the Global Refuge foster care network, found a loving family in Worcester, Massachusetts who was eager to welcome Juanita into their brood, making her an instant big sister to three younger foster siblings.

"They were so welcoming. It felt good. I just felt happy and excited," she says.

Her foster parents, both educators, were an ideal match, wholeheartedly supporting Juanita's laser-focused goals on higher education—a value instilled in her at an early age.

"My biological parents were always big into education, even though they didn't have the opportunity [themselves], and I value that," she says. "I really appreciate my foster parents because without their help, I don't think I would be here now where I am."

And where is she? At the prestigious Smith College on full scholarship, pursuing her dreams and making her families in Guatemala and the U.S. immensely proud.

Pedro*

An artist's journey to America

Take a walk down the busy sidewalks of downtown San Antonio, Texas and you just may find an artist named Pedro* greeting you with a smile that's as bright and cheerful as his colorful paintings. That's because the former math and physics professor from Venezuela is grateful to have found safety, stability, and a renewed sense of purpose in his long journey to the United States.

As an outspoken opponent of his country's political dictatorship, Pedro feared for his safety and fled to escape persecution. Crossing through Colombia, then to Ecuador, Peru, and Mexico, Pedro almost drowned while attempting to cross the Rio Grande to the United States. If not for the help of a compassionate bystander — whom he calls an angel — he may not be alive today. "Too many people lose their life in this river," he says. "I am alive thanks to God, I know that."

His initial days in America were truly a test of endurance. In a foreign land, without a grasp of the language or a place to call home, Pedro didn't know where to turn. "In the beginning, I didn't have money. All my money I paid to get here. It was no easy life."

He sought refuge in a San Antonio church, where he was introduced to the Global Refuge team, who helped him complete his asylum application, secure an apartment, and enroll in English classes.

"They guided me on what I needed to do as a newly arrived immigrant," he says. "They explained the process and have helped me so much."

Pedro now makes his living pursuing his passion for art, selling his canvases on the street, not just to earn money, but to spread joy and connect with people. "To sell pictures on the street is a different experience," he says. "It's a spiritual experience."

Firmly rooted in his life as a New American – and inspired by the kindness that was shown to him upon arrival to the U.S. – Pedro volunteers with a local non-profit to provide first aid to immigrants and refugees in need of medical care.

"I would like to continue my service, helping people in the United States," he says. "In my heart, I like to help people so much. Maybe God had a plan."
