What is F-1 Special Student Relief (SSR)?

Special Student Relief (SSR) is the **suspension** of certain regulatory requirements for eligible F-1 students from countries experiencing emergent circumstances as determined by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS). When a country is designated or redesignated for SSR, a notice is published in the <u>Federal Register</u>²

- An SSR notice will suspend restrictions related to on- and off-campus employment and may alter full course of study requirements for eligible F-1 students.

Who is Eligible for SSR?

In general, an SSR notice applies to **F-1 students** who meet all of the following conditions:

- Are defined as "F-1 students" under 8 CFR 214.2(f)(9)⁴
- Are a citizen of the designated country in the DHS notice (regardless of country of birth or last habitually resided in the designated country if they have no nationality),
- Were lawfully present in the United States in F-1 nonimmigrant status on the date specified in the applicable SSR notice,
- Are **enrolled** in an academic institution that is **certified** by <u>SEVP</u>⁵ to enroll F-1 nonimmigrant students,
- Are currently **maintaining F-1 nonimmigrant status**, and
- Are experiencing severe economic hardship as a direct result of the emergent circumstances in their country.

How Can I Request SSR?

Eligible **F-1 students** must provide evidence to their Designated School Official (DSO) that they were:

- 1. Lawfully present in the United States on the date specified in the applicable notice, and
- 2. Request that the DSO update their Student and Exchange Visitor Program (<u>SEVIS</u>)⁶ record and issue a new <u>Form I-20</u>⁷ certifying their eligibility.
