

USCIS Extends and Expands Fee Exemptions and Expedited Processing for Afghan Nationals

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On September 27, 2024, USCIS <u>announced</u> that it is extending and expanding filing fee exemptions and expedited processing for certain nationals of Afghanistan, including those who have pending or have already received Special Immigrant Visa (SIV) status, certain applicants for affirmative asylum, and OAR/OAW parolees.

The new and continued exemptions and expedited processing will help to mitigate some delays and address financial burdens impacting Afghan nationals navigating a complex and overburdened immigration system. This includes Afghan nationals who entered the U.S. temporarily on parole on or after July 31, 2021, and who are now seeking asylum. As of June 27, 2024, the USCIS asylum office received over 21,000 asylum applications filed by Afghan parolees, with an average adjudication time of 324 days—longer than the 150 days mandated by Congress.

The SIV program has also experienced considerable processing backlogs—leaving tens of thousands of Afghan nationals in the U.S. and abroad in a state of limbo. Over 124,000 Afghans still remain in the earliest stage of the SIV process. According to the latest SIV quarterly report, SIV processing is currently taking an average of 569 days, far longer than the nine months mandated by Congress. For those who arrived during Operation Allies Welcome (OAW) on parole and are still awaiting adjustment of status to lawful permanent residency (LPR), it is advisable to retain temporary protection and work authorization until LPR status, or a green card, is approved by USCIS.

These fee exemptions and expedited processing will help Afghan nationals resettle in the United States, and in many cases reunite with their family members, by enabling USCIS to more quickly process requests for employment authorization, long-term status, and associated services.
